# "Person-Centered Care" At Borden and Webster

Instead of hand lotion, deodorant, and other toiletries, the Borden Center's "Store Cart," operated by a cadre of Independent Living volunteers, will now offer as it rolls from room to room an assortment of free magazines, puzzle books, pencils, note cards, and -- most important of all -- a friendly one-to-one visit. The cart, in fact, will function as a sort of spring-board for the visit, a starting point.

This shift of emphasis is part of an overall movement in the Borden Center (skilled nursing care) and the Webster Center (assisted living) toward "person-centered care," in which each resident is seen as a unique individual, someone who merits personal visits and small-group activities that match his or her special interests.

"We're getting away from the idea of 'activities' as large groups of people, all doing the same thing," explains Laura Hotinger, Resident Life/Activities Coordinator. "Of course we'll still have some group games and get-togethers. But we want to make everything more homelike."

When imagining a small-scale and homelike atmosphere, Laura and her colleagues hope eventually to see a reconfiguration of the Borden Center with an emphasis on "neighborhoods," two or three of them perhaps, each with

a living area, a dining area, and a family style kitchen where residents might make themselves a sandwich or a cup of cocoa whenever they feel like it.

Kendal's current Master Plan embraces the "neighborhood" idea, but, of course, any decision about what will actually be done is still in the future. This future might be getting a bit closer, though.

Laura points out that the Webster Center is already something of a model for the "neighborhood" concept -- kitchen and all. Webster has twenty studio apartments and primarily serves contract residents who entered Kendal in an Independent Living cottage or apartment but who now find themselves in need of providing a higher level of care.

The Borden Center is different in many ways. With its sixty beds, it offers skilled nursing care to the entire Rockbridge area and has done so since 2002, when Lexington's Stonewall Jackson Hospital discontinued its extended care unit and many of the patients transferred to Kendal's newly-built facility. (The Kendal newsletter for October, 2002, describes a parade of ambulances, vans, and private cars arriving on "a warm, sunny Saturday morning" in late September. Independent Living residents greeted the newcomers and helped them settle into their rooms.)

#### "Person-Centered Care" (from p. 1)

At present, Kendal's Independent Living residents are a definite minority in the Borden Center -- fewer than ten in mid-February -- and consequently the Borden Center is very much oriented to, and enmeshed with, the larger Lexington/Rockbridge community. Some of our per diem Borden residents are here for a short stay, perhaps recuperating and receiving therapy after surgery or an illness; others have been with us for years. Families and friends come from all over to visit. There are no restricted hours, and visitors may walk in at any time. Many of the volunteers helping with activities at Borden come from the wider community, while others, like the "store cart" group, come from Kendal's Independent Living sector.

Laura especially urges volunteers to drop in for informal visits. "Borden residents love music, and if you turn on their iPod for them, you can both listen." The iPods are individually loaded with selections chosen by the resident or sometimes by his or her family, and are available through Kendal's "Music and Memory" program. (Research has shown that listening to one's favorite music is not only a lifelong joy but an aid to health and alertness.)

Volunteers are welcome to take part in programs that are coordinated by the Activities staff or to originate their own personal missions. Some of these gifts of time are very simple. Two Independent Living residents, almost every evening after supper, walk over to Borden and chat with people they know. Another frequently spends an hour of a Wednesday morning reading poetry to an attentive group in the Borden sunroom -- a project that was entirely this residents' own idea.

# The Invention that Changed the World by Robert Buderi (Simon and Schuster, 1996)

A writer named Robert Buderi was strolling across the MIT campus one day in 1986. He noticed a rickety old building which was about to be torn down. His curiosity led to a fascinating story which is still missed by most historians. This story has its roots in World War I, and ends with a subplot that I have yet to see reported.

An engineer named Vannevar ("rhymes with achiever") Bush had ten minutes scheduled with President Franklin R. Roosevelt in 1940. Vannevar Bush walked in with a single sheet of paper and walked out with FDR's approval. A special organization of civilian scientists and engineers with a direct connection to the White House was formed to coordinate science, engineering, and manufacturing with the military, "should war come."

Ernest Lawrence, inventor of the cyclotron, helped sponsor a new laboratory to develop better radar. The lab was deceptively named the Radiation Laboratory, or Rad Lab, so people would think it was merely another of Lawrence's nuclear physics labs. It was housed at MIT. Nuclear physicists suspended their careers on short notice to become radar engineers and inventors. Did anyone ever wonder why so many nuclear physicists were corralled in one place to become radar engineers? (Einstein had already signed two secret letters to President Roosevelt.)

My father worked in the Rad Lab from 1942 to 1945. My mother helped out at a small laboratory down the street which made radar countermeasures. Also developed at the Rad Lab was LORAN, a long-range radio navigation system. No, Virginia, we didn't always have satellites.

A small but powerful source of microwaves was urgently needed, to track individual airplanes and submarines from the ground and from the air. Eight countries were working on radar when the British decided, in 1940, to share their military technology with the USA. One of their secrets was a copper cylinder which would fit in the palm of your hand. It was based on an American invention, improved by the Germans, and was a tremendously powerful source of microwaves. Two British scientists, Boot and Randal, had made it practical and called it a cavity magnetron.

During wartime, basic scientific research tends to be replaced by rapid development of weapons technology. In the case of radar, some basic research in the behavior of ultrahigh frequency radio waves (microwaves) had to be done during the war, in addition to a large amount of development.

The planned announcement of radar in August, 1945 was overshadowed by the dropping of the A-bomb on Japan. Some radar people commented that along with the sacrifices of millions, "Radar won the war; The Bomb only shortened it."

Other books about radar, by Bowen, Guerlac, Pollard, and Brown, for example, tell us about radar in other countries. The fascinating and important story of radar in the USA and Britain has been told in a highly readable, non-technical manner by Buderi.

Brittany graduated from Rockbridge County High School, then completed an associate's degree in general studies at Dabney Lancaster Community College. She took online courses through the Mary Baldwin College adult degree program, and has completed her Bachelor's degree in Social Work.

"I've learned a lot," Brittany says, "but there's a lot to learn." She especially enjoyed working with and learning from Shana Colwell and from

Brittany's job involves a great deal of careful record-keeping -- documenting individual patient assessments, for example, and the information needed for Medicare. She works in particular with residents in transition, entering the Borden Center or leaving it.

# "Mock Con" Watch Party A Decided Success

In what was probably the most extensive single program ever undertaken by the Culture and Entertainment Committee, Kendal Hall became the venue for the live video streaming of all four sessions, taking place over two days, of W&L's 2016 "Mock Convention."

Balloons, festive hats and leis, and refreshments (including a cash bar) were on offer Friday and Saturday, February 12 and 13. The main focus, of course, was the big screen. Following an impressive line-up of speakers, many of them nationally known, Kendalites watched students playing the part of state delegates choose Donald Trump as the Republican presidential nominee. Trump, with 1,320 electoral votes, led Ted Cruz, with 652; Marco Rubio, 399; Jeb Bush, 72; and John Kasich, 19.

W&L students' prediction of the person whom the party out of power in the White House would nominate for President has been correct in 19 out of 25 elections. (The most recent wrong choice occurred in 2008, when students picked Hilary Clinton over Barack Obama.) Except for 1920 and 1940, when no mock conventions were held, the tradition goes back to 1908, when students correctly chose William Jennings Bryan as the Democratic nominee. (Bryan lost the election to William Howard Taft.)

The students put untold hours of work into this major research project, following the polls and other events taking place in their designated states. They also raise the money for their speakers -- a line-up which this year included Newt Gingrich (Congressman from Georgia, 1979-1999; Speaker of the House, 1995-1999) and Dick Cheney (Vice President, 2001-2009).

Cheney, who spoke on Friday evening, noted that four other vice presidents had

spoken at Mock Con before him, including Harry Truman, Richard Nixon, and Dan Quayle. The fourth, Alben Barkley, died of a heart attack while giving his speech on April 30, 1956. "Statistically, I guess three out of four vice presidents can be expected to survive the excitement at W&L," Cheney went on. And, "for the record, I've never felt better."

Matt Bevin, now Governor of Kentucky and a W&L graduate (class of 1989), spoke on Saturday afternoon. In a passing reference to Barkley's death, Bevin observed that it would be hard to imagine a better way to go.

A remarkable number of present-day Kendalites were attending Mock Con in various capacities on this memorable day sixty years ago: Mary Coulling, Sally Holland, Lew John, Hardin Marion, Uncas McThenia, Matt Paxton, and Larry Weinerth. In addition, Farris Hotchkiss, longtime Kendal supporter and Board member, was standing on the running track above the gym, as was current resident Tom Litzenberg.

and fresher setting will be the responsibility of the maintenance staff. First to be hung will be artwork owned by residents, and the residents concerned can decide exactly where they would like them placed. (It is a longstanding custom at Kendal for apartment dwellers to hang artwork belonging to them in the corridors outside their apartments.) Next to go up will be artwork that has been donated to Kendal. With regard to this category, Bill says, the residents' Furnishings and Interiors Committee may decide to swap things around a bit. "Some change is good," says Bill.

♥ Why the Webster Center Is Different from the way it was in 2000, when Kendal opened, was explained at the Residents Association meeting of February 17 by Charlotte Sibold, Health Services Administrator. A much larger proportion of Webster residents now has dementia, or some degree of cognitive impairment, than was once the case. These

residents can no longer recognize danger. To keep them safe, doors have been installed for entering or exiting the Webster Center, with an alarm system. However, there are many Webster residents who do not have dementia, and the system allows these to come and go as they please. This "mixed population," Charlotte says, is preferable to trying to care for all residents with dementia in the Borden Center because the Webster contingent does not need skilled nursing care -- just a safe place to live.

If with the heavy schedule of new occupancies behind them, the Maintenance Department Is working hard to catch up on work orders, according to Helen Staley, convener of the residents' Facilities Committee. If you have submitted a maintenance request that remains unresolved, now is a good time to call that to the attention of Bill Houff, Director of Operations.
